

Links

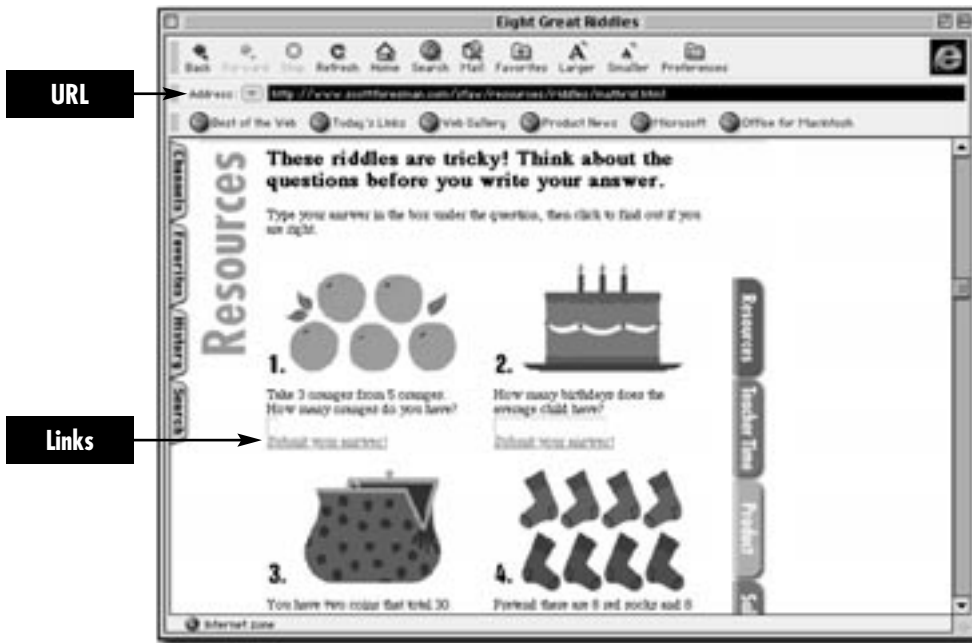
Words or phrases on a Web page that are links usually appear underlined and in color: most often blue if you have not yet clicked on them, purple if you have. (The creator of a Web page can specify the colors. You can change the colors of visited and unvisited links yourself by choosing Preferences on the Edit menu.) Click once on a link and the browser will retrieve the page associated with the link.

Cursor

A movable mark on a computer screen, indicating the point at which the displayed data may be altered or at which new data may be inserted.

URL

Universal Resource Locator: a World Wide Web address. The URL is embedded within a hyperlink, so that when you click on the link, your computer knows where to find the file you want. You can also find a Web site by typing its URL in the address box.

In addition to text, graphics can also be links. To determine if a graphic is a link, move the mouse so the arrow is over the image. If the arrow turns into a hand, the image is a link. At this time the link's URL may also appear at the bottom of the browser window.
